Attendance matters

As the Headteacher of Greatstone Primary School, a big part of my role is to evaluate 'where we are' and what we could do better. This is always rewarding, challenging and incredibly motivating.

One of these areas, is our attendance. Historically, this has been significantly below the national average and therefore a key priority for our school. I'm fully aware, that due to CV-19, children may need to isolate which is only right and proper—the safety of our children and their families has and always will be, very important to us. Children who are absent for reasons related to the pandemic will not be penalised, it just simple wouldn't be fair.

Children learn best when they are in school, I think as a nation we recognise this now more than ever following the national lockdown in the summer term. Children need to be with their friends and to learn from teachers . Did you know, that continued attendance below 90% can result in up a whole GCSE grade lower at secondary school? Missing education can affect children's mental health, their confidence as well as impacting negatively on their education.

With this in mind, we will be working closely with you to improve our overall school attendance from the 92% where it has been, to reach 96% which is where it should be. This will require a massive effort from everyone, including parents.

As you will be aware, no Headteacher is allowed to authorise any holidays during term time, this has been the law since 2013. For any parent who takes their child out of school for a two week holiday— we have to and will refer for a penalty notice. This will be for the local authority to issue and they will collect the fines— no money is received by us from this process. Our advice therefore is always LOOK BEFORE YOU BOOK— check out the term times (which can be found on the school calendar) before you make any holiday reservations please.

As a whole school, we will be rewarding children for their good attendance across a term through our new gold, silver and bronze certificates which will celebrate attendance from 95% upwards. If your child has been off due to CV-19 related circumstances, this absence will not be included within our calculations.

At the end of each term, we will share the overall class attendance with you so you can monitor the progress we are making. There will also be an overall award for the class with the highest attendance at the end of the year.

We hope you understand and appreciate why this is such an important issue—for families where attendance is a concern, you will be able to work with Mrs Roberts closely to make improvements.

Please make sure that you have downloaded the new NHS CV-19 app to help the track and trace process—thank you.

Thank you to everyone who is leaving the playground in a timely manner at the end of each day, this is really helping. If you leave via the front of the school, we ask that you carefully observe others leaving the playground, there is the gate by Diamond class to reduce the flow of people using the gate by the top path.

We are making sure that we open the gates in the morning and afternoon a little earlier so that parents have time to walk onto the playground (if they have a child in KS1) whilst keeping a distance. In the mornings, please do keep your child with you until we open the gates, this is to make sure there isn't a large group of children (and therefore bubbles mixing) by the gate that I usually open. The crowd certainly isn't as big each morning, but there's still room for improvement. Parents who use the gate by the car park, please remember to socially distance whilst you are waiting.

New signs reminding everyone to keep their distance have been put up around the school as visual reminders (these ones are a bit more heavy duty so will hopefully survive the bad weather a little longer this time).
